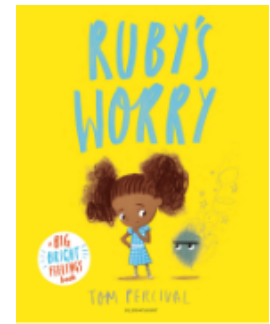
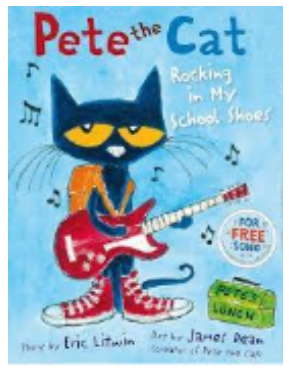
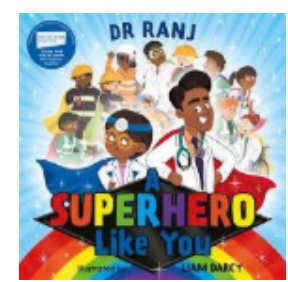
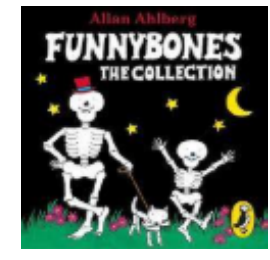


Literacy

The Children will show a love for books, songs, and rhymes, handling books correctly and following print. They recognise rhyming words, segment and blend sounds, and match spoken to written words. They write some letters from their name, identify initial sounds, and begin writing simple words and labels using known sounds.

Personal, Social and Emotional

They will share their hobbies and feelings, learning what emotions like happiness feel like. They'll explore zones of regulation and use texts to support emotional understanding. They'll learn about oral hygiene, handwashing, and the importance of exercise. They'll follow class rules and show respect through kind words and listening.

Understanding the World



They will explore how they've grown since being babies, identify family members, and recognise different beliefs and celebrations. They'll compare families, show interest in jobs and lifestyles, and name body parts and senses. They'll talk about Autumn and share experiences with family, building awareness of themselves and the world around them.



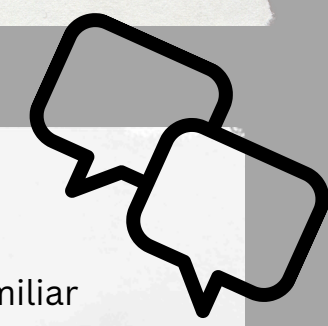
Expressive Arts and Design

They will sing nursery rhymes and songs, develop storylines in play, and explore sound through rhythm and pitch games. They'll mix primary colours, use glue to join materials, and draw self-portraits with clear features. These activities support creativity, fine motor skills, and imaginative expression through music, art, and play.



Communication and Language

They will build friendships, talk about familiar experiences, and share their passions and dreams. They'll learn about family routines and special occasions, show interest in others' lives, and follow instructions. Through group discussions, they'll practise turn-taking and respectful listening, developing confidence in expressing themselves and connecting with others.



Physical Development

The Children will build fine motor skills through threading, cutting, weaving, and playdough. They'll improve pencil grip, draw lines and circles, and use tools like cutlery. They'll practise self-care skills like taking shoes off and on. Activities like finger rhymes, clapping, and floor push-ups help strengthen muscles and coordination.
